MODBURY PARISH PLAN

Doesn't it seem a long time ago now when the Christmas lights were switched on? What a good night it was, with the centre of town thronged with people and the shops displaying their wares. Up in the Assembly Rooms there was a colourful display of the results of the Parish Plan questionnaire, with tables and pie charts explaining what you had said is important for the future of our community.

There were also pies of the edible variety for the early birds, thanks to Naomi Ainsley and Burda Gage. Some 250 people visited the exhibition over the Friday night and Saturday morning and also took the opportunity to see the wonderful old photos Modbury that are a feature of refurbishment the Assembly Rooms. The Steering Group would like to Robin Brewer. thank Manager of the White Hart, for his help and for providing the facilities to allow the exhibition to be held on such a busy night.

We are now using information you provided to look at the issues and options and to work up an action plan. Some things can be done quickly while others will take more time. We have recruited some more volunteers to help do this analysis, specifically looking at the key issues of shopping and parking; youth and leisure facilities; long term planning and low cost housing; 'green" issues; and potential of a Town Square behind the White Hart. Steering Group and the new volunteers are working 100% on behalf of the residents of the Parish to convert your wishes into the Modbury Parish Plan.

A Happy New Year to you all

January is usually the coldest month so keep well wrapped up if you venture out to do any gardening. However there is not much to do this month so use the time to plan for the comina season.

Beds and Borders

I am often asked how to hide eyesores. Some of the worst offenders are fixed oil tanks, manhole covers and wheelie bins. Plants can be used in a variety of ways to help with these issues but be careful that you don't make a problem worse by drawing attention to it.

A manhole cover in a lawn or patio can be replaced by a special plastic cover which can be filled with soil and grass seed, or paving to match the patio. If it lies in a border it can be hidden by allowing a juniper or cotoneaster to grow forward across it, or a climber like clematis or jasmine can be draped over it. All these solutions still allow access for maintenance. Fixed tanks for oil or gas are a bigger problem as you will need some kind of trellis or wire structure for plants to grow up, and this can look worse than the tank.

If the garden is large, it can look better to grow a sizeable group of shrubs in front of the tank, leaving an area for filling and maintenance immediately in front of the tank. If you do this, remember to vary the shape of the shrubs and grow them in a rough triangle rather than a line.

A good easy group would be berberis darwinii, philadelphus, the Mock Orange and phyllostachys nigra, the Black Bamboo. If you haven't got the room for this, try painting the tank and its supports in a neutral khaki colour and grow one large glamorous shrub nearby.



A magnolia, a camellia or a shrub rose would be ideal and will draw the eye away from the

tank. Hiding your wheelie bins is difficult because you need to get to them every day and they must be wheeled out once a week.

The ideal solution would be a bay off your drive or path with evergreen shrubs on either side to screen it from view. If this isn't possible you could use a 'hedge' grown in one or more troughs to hide it.

Paths and Patios

Keep the paths and your patio free of ice using salt or grit. Wrap up tender plants like bananas using bubble wrap or fleece, and stand pots on pot feet to allow air to circulate underneath. Don't forget to feed the birds.

Vegetables



So many people want to grow their own vegetables now and I notice that the Parish Questionnaire showed a large number of people wanting an allotment. Growing your own vegetables is one of the most rewarding things you can do in your spare time. An allotment is great but the ideal is always your own garden as you can keep a close daily eye on how things are growing, and nip problems in the bud.

All you need is sun and earth to grow vegetables. Even those without soil can grow a good range of veggies in tubs and what the Americans call "flats", which are large deep trays of soil. Peas, beans,

salad veg, tomatoes, baby carrots and even new potatoes can all be grown in small amounts in containers. You might want to consider changing a border into a potager, an area where vegetables grow alongside flowers, or taking up some paving on your patio (often the sunniest part of the garden) to create veggie beds. Don't rule out the front garden if it is the only sunny space. There is no reason why rows of neatly kept vegetables mixed with flowers and herbs should not look as attractive as a lawn.

Six Great Early Bulbs to brighten up the winter months

(You may be able to buy these in pots already in flower. If not plant them in late Spring for next year).

Snowdrop Galanthus elwesii is the earliest, usually in flower in January.

Winter Aconite Eranthis hymelis. A little green ruff surrounds the yellow buttercup-like flowers in January or February.

Algerian Iris *Iris unguicularis.* Grows in very poor soil, even in pure gravel. Pretty lavender flowers all through winter.

Cyclamen *coum* Tiny little dark pink flowers from December on. Try it under a tree.

Hoop Petticoat Daffodil *Narcissus bulbodicum*. Worth a try. If it likes your garden it will increase every year. In flower in January.

- Real Christmas trees can be put in your brown bin (you may need to cut it down to fit) or it can be taken to the Recycling Centre at Bridge Court, Ivybridge.

- > Cans and plastic bottles go in the clear recycling sack.
- Please take empty glass jars and bottles to the bottle bank in the lower car park, Poundwell Meadow.

REGISTER OF ELECTORS

The latest register of electors has been published and can be inspected in the Parish Office.

There will be local elections in May, for both the District Council and the Parish Council.

CONTACTING THE POLICE

Everyone knows how to contact the police in an emergency, but do you know how to contact them for non-emergency matters? Recently there has been publicity about people using the emergency 999 number to contact the police for non-emergency, thereby clogging up the phone lines and possibly putting lives at risk. If you want to speak to the police when it is not an emergency - the number is **08452 777 444**.

We understand some people find it far from easy to find this number in the telephone directory, so it may be useful to note it and keep it in a safe place.

CAR PARKING CHARGES

SHDC are proposing changes to car park charges. The good news is they plan to reduce the ½ hour rate to 25p. The bad news is they plan to increase the other rates.

Modbury Parish Council have welcomed the new rate for the ½ hour, but have asked that there is no increase - even a reduction - for the rate for 1 hour, to help our local shops and shoppers.

Changes have been made to this service over the New Year period due to the Bank Holidays. Please note:

Entertainment provided by Ivor Davies with his taped recordings of famous voices and events and we had to guess whose voices were being played, i.e. Winston Churchill etc. Some were quite hard to recognise, such as Oswald Mosley. We also had to guess who was singing 'Underneath Arches' which prompted everyone to join in with the recording. We then had to guess the name and origin of several items which Phil Andrews had brought along from his collection 'antiquities', followed bv photographic quiz arranged by Mary Timmis, consisting of a number of Modbury locations - some quite difficult to recognise.

Roy Sims had brought along his laptop with a CD of sections of the now restored Tithe Map (which we shall be showing at a later date on a more convenient occasion). The 9 aerial photographs taken of the Modbury area were on display. These have been purchased by the Society and were obtained by Roy Sims from Devon County Hall (HER Resource Centre).

The photographs were taken on December 10th 1946 on a photo-reconnaissance mission from RAF Benson, by a Mosquito plane, and it is fascinating to note how much development has taken place during the past 60 years.

Finally we were treated to mulled wine and mince pies etc, which were ably organised by our treasurer, Stephanie Linnell.


