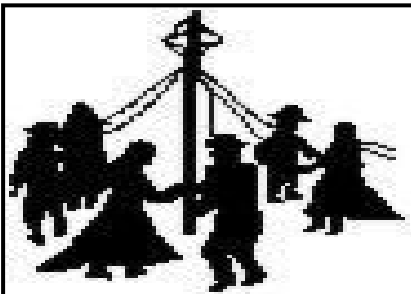

PARISH AND DISTRICT COUNCIL ELECTIONS 2007? - - OR SELF-APPOINTED COUNCILLORS?

May this year will not only be the time for Modbury May Fair but 3rd May should be Election Day for both the Parish and South Hams District Councils.

An election will not take place unless more parishioners are nominated for election than the number of councillors required. In the case of the Parish Council there are 12 councillors and at District Council Modbury is entitled to 2 representatives.

Last time only 8 people were nominated for election to the Parish Council. The first meeting of the council was held by them and they had to co-opt on to the council 4 people, who by then had expressed an interest and volunteered, to make up the number.

As part of their duties Parish Councillors decide the amount of money required by the Parish each year; this forms

part of your Council Tax Bill; and then they decide how that money is spent. Not to have an election means that you have no say in who should make these decisions and others that the Parish Council make on your behalf.

Several of the present councillors have already indicated that they will not be seeking nomination this year and that means that we need to encourage as many people as possible to stand if a Democratic Election is to take place.

Could you be a Councillor? Think about it - and the next edition of the Messenger will give more information about what is involved, who is eligible and how to set about it if you are willing to stand.

Angela's Garden Corner

Your Garden in March

Traditionally this month is the start of the gardener's year. The winter has been very mild but wind damage has been considerable.

LAWNS

When mowing the lawn for the first time after the winter, always set the blades high and use the grass box. If you are adding the clippings to your compost heap they will rot a lot quicker if you mix them with shredded paper (an ideal use for old bills, etc) or torn up newspaper.

BEDS AND BORDERS

If you want to keep your garden simple, consider the use of architectural or feature plants. Instead of traditional borders you could lay the whole area to gravel or grass with a group of well-chosen plants. A few pots on the patio and your garden would be complete. This type of garden lends itself to modern houses and the minimalist look but it is also cheap to make and maintain and so is ideal for someone older or on a limited budget. Choosing the right plants is important. The larger grasses and bamboos work very well, also yuccas, phormiums, fatshedera and some of the viburnums. The large leaved trees like cercis - the Judas Tree, or ailanthus - the Tree of Heaven, are also effective.

When buying plants try to choose types that will thrive in the conditions in your garden. Wet soil for example is ideal for some plants and death to others. (See this month's feature). Remember that well chosen plants can help to drain a boggy area or retain the soil on a steep bank by preventing erosion, or protect dry soil from blowing away. This is a good month to plant herbaceous and shrubby plants as long as the soil is not too wet.

In the established garden, prune the roses and the old tops of perennial plants. Weed the soil around plants and mulch the bare earth. Remove or prune any plants damaged by the gales and mend their supports if

necessary. If any tender plants have been damaged by frost or wind-burn, wait a few more weeks to see where new shoots are emerging before trimming them. Plant summer bulbs, like gladioli and agapanthus. Move any spring bulbs that are in the wrong place or getting overcrowded. This is the best month to sow hardy annuals, like poppies, cornflowers and love-in-a-mist. Sow them in shallow drills and mark the rows with sticks so that you don't hoe them out when weeding.

VEGETABLES AND FRUIT

Dig over your soil and break it down using a rake or hoe, ready to sow the first vegetable seeds. The soil must be dry and warm enough or the seed will rot. If weed seeds are germinating it is a sign that the soil is warm. It is better to wait a little longer if you are not sure the soil is ready, as seeds sown in April usually do as well as those sown in March. If, as I suggested, you have covered some of your vegetable beds with plastic sheeting, you will be able to start sowing now. Protect vulnerable seeds with horticultural fleece

Before sowing seeds a 'stale' seed bed should be prepared. The soil is made ready and left until weed seeds in the ground have germinated. Weeds are then hoed off before the seed is sown. This may sound like extra delay and work but it will give much better results and avoids wasting expensive seed.

In the greenhouse you can start sowing trays and pots of less hardy vegetables like sweetcorn and peppers, so they will be ready for planting out later on. If you sowed early seeds last month make sure they do not get leggy on the windowsill. As soon as the

greenhouse warms up they can go out. Apply well-rotted manure to your fruit bushes and complete any pruning.

POTS AND PATIOS

From now on the patio will be used more and more, so tidy up any winter debris and clean the furniture. Spring pots should be looking their best and may need watering in dry spells. If you are bringing on mini plug plants in your greenhouse you will probably need to pot them on into bigger plugs soon.

POOLS

Pond life is waking up after its winter dormancy, so be very careful when clearing up. Tadpoles and fish fry can be destroyed by over-enthusiastic tidying. Feed the fish when they wake up. A vitamin and mineral supplement may be given.

SIX GREAT PLANTS FOR BOGGY OR WET AREAS

Cornus alba siberica - The Red Stemmed Dogwood will grow even in a swamp. Red stems in winter.

Phyllostachys aurea - The Golden Bamboo is ideal for damp sites where you want a screen which doesn't block light.

Osmunda regalis -The Royal Fern is large and impressive with coppery young fronds in Spring.

Rodgersia pinnata - is a large clump-forming perennial with huge fingered leaves and orange fluffy flowers on tall stems.

Soleirolia - is also known as Mind-your-own-business and is a tiny carpeting plant which can get out of hand. It is ideal however for covering damp ground where nothing else will grow, creating a lawn like effect.

Astrantia -The Masterwort is a very pretty herbaceous plant with pink or white scabious-like flowers.

MODBURY PARISH PLAN

The Community Council Roadshow at the White Hart was attended by representatives of about 20 groups/organisations. The experts from the Community Council of Devon and the Council for Voluntary Service were kept busy giving advice on the sources of funds and how to go about putting bids together. We also had information from the South Devon Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and South Hams District Council.

The five working groups have made good progress in analysing the outcomes of the household questionnaire and determining the issues to be addressed. They are now investigating how to resolve these and making recommendations to put in the plan. The intention is to have a draft available by early April which can be discussed with the Parish Council before it is published more widely.

Mark Lawrence has resigned as Chairman of the Steering Group due to other commitments. Nigel Lee and Chris Birch will co-chair the Steering Group until the plan is published.

Modbury Parish Plan Steering Group

Mark Lawrence writes.....

It has been great working with the Steering Group over the past year. The superb response you all gave to the questionnaire and your comments at the exhibitions show that community spirit is alive and well in Modbury. I was also very pleased by the number of people volunteering to help on the working groups.

I know the group is in safe hands and I wish the new co-chairmen all the best over the next few months until the Parish Plan is published.

ALLOTMENTS

The Parish Plan questionnaire result showed that 101 people are interested in renting an allotment.

We invite anyone interested to submit their name and address to the Parish Office so that a 'Working Group' can be formed to take the next step in finding land for rent and liaising with the Parish Council. The Working Group would then be able to have the first allotments as they become available.

TITHE MAP WORKSHOP

There was a great response to this, with many people attending. The numbers included a group from Modbury, and others from Aveton Gifford and Bigbury. Kingston studied eleven farms, and Modbury nine, and a mill from each of the two parishes was included. The results, which have all to be collated, focused on the size of each farm or holding, the crops that were grown, the members of the household living on the farm, and any interesting field names were

noted. The majority of the farmers were tenants, which was usual at the time: 1838-42.

The largest farm was Scobbiscombe, which was mostly arable. Wonwell had the largest area of orchard – over 7 acres. The smallest holding was farmed by John Ryder, who was described in both the 1841 & 1851 Census as a 'farmer', and it was not until the 1861 Census that he was shown as a 'victualler' – the landlord of The Dolphin.

The field names also provided information – Wonwell had a 'deer park', a 'clay field' – this could mean 'land where clay was dug' as well as just a field of heavy soil, a 'peas' field, and a large area of 'honey land' – this could be a description of land exceptionally productive i.e. 'flowing with milk and honey', or sticky i.e. land difficult to work – the areas in this instance were too large to suggest bees were kept there, which is a third interpretation.

Many of the names referred to the medieval period. One description which appeared in many farms referred to 'Waste' which was baffling, but further research suggests this meant grass verges etc – all subject to payment. This showed how detailed the surveyors had to be in drawing up their maps.

Despite the enormous enthusiasm, time ran out before all the farms were completed, and it has been suggested that a working group, meeting on a weekly basis, be set up to take the project further. **If there is anyone wishing to take part in this could they contact either Jennie Stanley 810819, or Anne Scarratt 810786.**

PLANNING DECISIONS

Modbury Parish Council recommended approval and South Hams District Council granted permission for the following:

- ❖ Collywell Cottage, Brownston – Amendment to previous permission for extension and garage.
- ❖ 4 Poundwell Street – Erection of extension and minor alternations to ground floor.
- ❖ Little Brownston Farm – Renewal of redundant planning permission.

ROAD CLOSURE

By now work should have begun on the water mains in **Poundwell Street**. We have been notified that the work was due to start on 26 February and may continue for up to 40 days.

The road from **Galpin Street to Babland Cross** will be closed from 5 March for up to 33 days, again for work on upgrading the water mains.

Notices of these road closures and maps giving alternative routes can be seen on the Parish Noticeboard outside the Post Office.

The Royal British Legion Modbury Branch

At our February meeting we were given a most interesting talk by one of our Ermington members, Mr George Luckraft. George was a Warrant Officer in the Royal Air Force during the 1939-45 World War and he experienced active service as a Wireless Operator on Lancaster Bombers. He called his talk 'The Longest Day' and he focussed it on a typical day when the bombing raids took place on Germany.

The planes were very uncomfortable and noisy – so noisy in fact that the crew were only able to communicate with each other by microphone. The vibration was terrific and unlike modern airliners, there was no air conditioning, insulation or heating. The fuel was contained in the wings and when combined with the large number of bombs carried, the crew were in a very dangerous situation at all times. Many of the bombers never returned from the missions and George and his colleagues often woke up the following morning to see empty beds in their dormitory. This alone must have been nerve-racking. We owe these men a great debt of gratitude – not only the Air Force crews, but members of all the Services.

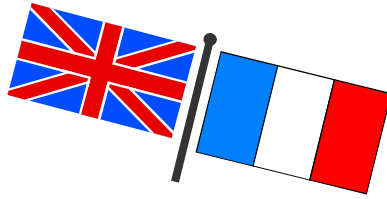
WE WILL REMEMBER THEM

MODBURY LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

Our second talk of the year was given by Miss Margaret Lorenz, Chairman of the Cookworthy Museum of Rural Life, Kingsbridge on 14 February. She began by telling us about the history of the building in which the Museum is housed. This was formerly occupied by Kingsbridge Grammar School until the 'modern' school was built in 1931 in Westville, nowadays the

Community College. For several years the old building was used as a dormitory for the boarders who attended the school from all over the South Hams and they had to walk from Westville to the top of Fore Street every day at lunchtime. After a period of disuse it was decided to turn it into a Museum, with financial assistance from English Clays.

William Cookworthy lived in Kingsbridge and is remembered for his work and invention in the china clay industry, especially in the field of porcelain which was produced in Plymouth on the site of what is now known as the China House Restaurant in Sutton Road. The Museum is now a Local Heritage Centre, open throughout the year, where one can explore local and family history. Research Assistants are in attendance, for details ring 853235.

Miss Lorenz was warmly thanked for her fascinating talk by our Chairman, Mary Timmis, who said that no doubt many of the members present would be visiting the Museum in the near future.

The next meeting will be taking place on **Wednesday 14 March** and will be the last talk of the current season. We shall be welcoming Mr Michael Vyner from Torquay, who will be giving us an illustrated talk with the title 'TRACKS, TURNPIKES & TOLLHOUSES'. He will be tracing the road system in Devon from smugglers' tracks around Brixham to the medieval routes across Dartmoor, to the toll roads. Carriages, wayside stones and toll-houses are covered in this interesting insight to a subject of which there is much in evidence still to see. Don't miss it!

Meetings commence at 7.30 pm in the Assembly Room of the White Hart, by kind permission of the Management. Casual visitors welcome @ £2.00 per meeting.
