

#### ST GEORGE'S CHURCH CAR PARK: OFFICIAL OPENING ON PALM SUNDAY

Most residents of Modbury will be aware that over the last 3 months a new car park has been built near to St George's Church. Sited off Church Lane, it has been carefully developed using local contractors and volunteer help so that it will enhance the local landscape and not detract from an area of outstanding natural beauty. So what has been done?

The first step was to level the site, dividing the parking area with hedge banks and building a 1.2 metre hedge bank around the perimeter. Over 200 tons of rolled sand and stone were then laid in the main driveway and the parking areas before installing 'grasscrete' in the parking bays. The grasscrete used was a jigsaw of recycled, high pressure polythene panels that are green in colour and interlock to form a honeycomb structure that is then filled with topsoil and sown with a specific mix of grass seed. Once the grass grows, this produces a hard wearing surface suitable for vehicle and pedestrian traffic and will require maintenance. The next step was to clear a 6 metre wide strip to plant a copse along the field boundary and install a stock proof fence. The final stages of the ground works included improving the visibility of the exit onto Church Lane, rerouting water meters, laying a tarmac entrance, installing gates and building a pedestrian exit.

The most detailed part of the plan was the landscaping of the area with over 1400 native species planted in the 6-metre wide copse along the 100-metre boundary, as well as in 145 metres of hedge banks. Although most of the planting consisted of small trees, whips and shrubs, a number of larger trees were planted to give immediate height and structure to the planting. As the Church had been so fortunate to benefit from a generous donation from the Betty Coyte Trust for the car park, it was felt that a similar gesture should be made by making a donation to a charity. Therefore the larger trees

were donated by Parishioners as Memorial Trees and raised £400 for Christian Aid. The final part of the planting was to sow wild flower seeds and plant 200 primroses and over a 1000 daffodils which were kindly donated by Rob West.

The initial impression of the area was rather stark with bare earth and 1400 plastic hedge and tree guards waving in the breeze, but the mild, wet weather is already working its magic on the grass and each week it turns a deeper shade of green. SHDC have kept a close eve on the development and have inspected the site on several occasions to ensure that the natural look of the area is retained. The finishing touches of stone-facing the pedestrian entrance, trimming the existing hedge and erecting the signs are now being completed and the car park will be ready for use by Easter, just as the daffodils are at their best. The ribbon cutting will be carried out by Thelma Butland and John Coyte, both cousins of Betty Coyte, on Sunday 16 March at 10 o'clock, immediately prior to the Palm Sunday service.

The car park will provide a useful community facility and will be much welcomed by those attending the Churches, particularly on wet days and during the festivals, weddings and funerals that attract large congregations. In accordance with the SHDC planning permission, its use is restricted to those attending services or special events at one of the 3 Churches and the Primary School. At other times, the car park will be kept locked and controlled by Parochial Church Council. Notices will be placed in the area to discourage parking in the entrance as it is regularly used for access to the fields by tractors and other vehicles. The footpath that runs between the car park and Runaway Lane has become extremely muddy with all the wet weather and construction traffic but is being closely monitored to see how it settles down in the spring with the drier weather and less traffic.

Finally, I would like to pass on a big vote of thanks to all those who have helped create the car park: from Rob West, John Coyte and Adrian Woods, whose knowledge and support in the planning phase were invaluable, to Martin and Colin Stallard and their

expertise in completing the ground works, but particularly to the numerous volunteers who turned out in foul weather to plant daffodils, trees, shrubs and whips. I would also like to thank those who planted Memorial trees, but special thanks should go to a small group of young people who over 2 days completed the back-breaking work of laying nearly all the 3500 panels of grasscrete – Jessica, Alice, James and Daniel Smith, and particularly Tom Moore and Cameron Thorns.



# PLAN INTERNATIONAL (CHILD SPONSORSHIP)

#### **CAN YOU HELP?**

Since 1994 I have belonged to this wonderful organisation and supported a young girl, and her family, in South India. I paid £12 a month, and this money, along with many other sponsors' gifts, gradually raised the level of hygiene and education in Aruna's village to the standard where the community could look after themselves.

Plan International moved on, and in the year 2000 I was asked to say goodbye to Aruna and take a new child and family in Nepal. This was sad for me but I realised that Plan had done its job and we had given opportunities to people who previously had none.

As a sponsor you are encouraged to write to your sponsored child from time to time and if you wish enclose a few light gifts, i.e. ribbons, crayons and colouring book etc. Many sponsors have also taken a trip of a life-time to go and actually meet their sponsored child in their village.

Since 2000 I've had a little Nepalese girl, Renu, who is now 14, and whose village is again raising their standard of living. A new schoolroom and more books and equipment. Clean water. Better health care. More girls encouraged to stay in education. Small co-operatives for the women growing vegetables.

Now Plan International are asking me to recruit a new sponsor to care for little Radhika who will be 5 years old in June. She has parents, Dilip and Anita, and two brothers Raju (7) and Rahul (4). From her photograph she looks a sweetie! She and her family live in a small village in the East of Nepal. Their nearest city is Biratnagar. She has access to very basic health care, and girls tend to miss out on education. There are no latrines. Water is pumped from a covered well. So once again Plan is working here.

The monthly sponsorship is now £15 per month, but the benefits that I have seen with my child and her village have been enormous, and make that sum an infinitely worthwhile gift.

I am hoping that someone in Modbury may feel able to help little Radhika. I have further information awaiting you, and would love to welcome you to this great family of sponsors.

#### MODBURY HISTORY SOCIETY

#### **Modbury Barracks**

The Modbury History Society has recently had a request for information about the Barracks and we were prompted to remind the Parish community of the history of the Barracks and its occupants over a period of nearly one hundred years. Many walk by the Barracks unaware of its important history, although there is a Heritage Plaque mounted on the exterior wall of the original guardhouse.

The records show that the first building was established in 1794 and was intended for Infantry; however in 1802 there had been an additional cavalry barracks built to accommodate 58 men and 63 horses. These buildings, together with similar barracks which were established at Barnstaple, Totnes, and Trowbridge, were built by a John Scobell.

The records indicate that the cavalry still occupied the site in 1822, but the infantry regiments had by then departed. It would appear that the Barracks were no longer used by the military after 1846.

The recent enquiry from a relative of Godfrey Wycisk of Tavistock requested a copy of a letter sent to the Rev Leslie Hutchings who was the vicar in the 60/70s, detailing the military units that had occupied the barracks between 1797 and 1822. It is interesting to note that in an official barracks return of 1822, there appear to be only two men and two horses as occupants. We believe that by 1846 the cavalry unit had left Modbury.

The details that follow are copied from the letter sent by Godfrey Wycisk in 1967.

Military Units Occupying the Barracks Modbury:

#### 1797: Surrey Light Dragoons:

This would be a Yeomanry Unit formed under the Volunteer Act of 1794.

**1799: Somerset Cavalry:** Another similar unit to above.

**1799: Surrey Fencibles:** Fencibles were enlisted for full time soldiering but only required for duty in the UK.

#### 1800: Queen's Bay Dragoons:

A regular army unit. Full title 2<sup>nd</sup>

Queen's Regiment of Dragoon Guards. **During Fair Week last year, St** 

**1805:** 4<sup>th</sup> **Dragoon Guards** 4<sup>th</sup> (Royal Irish) Regiment of Dragoon Guards.

1805: 6<sup>th</sup> Dragoon Guards

6<sup>th</sup> Regiment of Dragoon Guards (Carabineers).

**1807-1808:** 3<sup>rd</sup> **Dragoon Guards:** 3<sup>rd</sup> (The Prince of Wales) Regiment of Dragoon Guards.

**1808: 13<sup>th</sup> Dragoon Guards:** 13<sup>th</sup> Regiment of Light Dragoons.

**1810:** 9<sup>th</sup> Regiment of Dragoons: 9<sup>th</sup> (The Queen's Royal) Regiment of Light Dragoons. The Lancers.

#### 1860: Local Volunteers:

Quote."The young men of the Parish" came forward with "alacrity" to form a band of Rifle Volunteers: They were enrolled under the Volunteer Act of 1859 in the local detachment of the 20<sup>th</sup> Devon (Kingsbridge) Corps, which were part of the 4<sup>th</sup> Devon Administrative Battalion RV with their HQ at Newton Abbot, commanded by Major James Templar of Teignmouth.

#### Church Parade - 1888

The church parade recorded in 1888 was attended by the descendants of the 1860 unit which by 1888 had been re-organised to become the 5<sup>th</sup> Haytor Battalion of the Devon Rifle Volunteers. Their HQ was still at Newton Abbot but the Officer I/c was now the 9<sup>th</sup> Baron Clifford of Chudleigh.

In 1908 the Haytor Battalion was merged with the Plymouth Battalion (Prince of Wales) to become the 5<sup>th</sup> Prince of Wales Battalion of the Devonshire Regiment. The regiment commander was Captain Square who directed the church parade and was eventually promoted Major and served until the early days of the twentieth century. The band that led the ceremony was the Modbury Town band.

Positive things are really beginning to happen in the Meadow. Up to now it has been mostly destruction, with lots of cutting down, clearing and burning. A tremendous amount has been achieved by volunteers from the community in groups both large and small.

We are now progressing well with the constructive phase. A key action was the involvement of Modbury School in the planting of the new orchard (see accompanying article and picture) and followed by volunteers planting about 300 small hedging plants of various native species to reinstate old 'Devon Hedge Banks'

On Monday 3<sup>rd</sup>. March South Hams District Council have promised to start the construction of our long awaited bridge, which will provide a level link from the town centre into the middle of the Meadow. This is planned to take about two weeks and should cause minimal disturbance to the residents of Tuckers Brook or Ayleston Park.

We are planning to have a formal opening ceremony for the Millennium Meadow, by a well known local personality, during this year's May Fair. Watch this space and the Fair Programme for more details.

#### BOYS AND GIRLS COME OUT TO PLAY



On Monday 28th January schoolchildren from years 5 and 6 at Modbury Primary School crocodiled down to the Millennium Meadow. Rather than play, the children came to help with planting a new orchard on the south side, which is to be left as a wild flower meadow.

Local landscape architect Andrew Rathbone, had previously been to the school and talked to the children about the meadow and its development. He also told them about the Devon varieties of fruit trees they would be helping to plant, with their intriguing names such as Devon Crimson Cream, Billy Down Pippin and Dittisham Ploughman. With their teachers, the children split into three groups, each planting four trees under the guidance of Andrew and other committee members. As can be seen in the picture, all the youngsters actively participated, and almost certainly some returned home somewhat muddy – luckily they had been warned to come with their Wellington boots.

Everyone had a good afternoon. The Modbury Millennium Meadow committee now hope that the school will feel a sense of ownership towards the orchard, and also be keen to make regular use of the meadow, for teaching purposes, in the future.

The planting afternoon has now widened the Meadow's age range of volunteer labour in its development for the benefit of the Modbury community. Further offers of support, especially from the younger generation would be very welcome.

# THE GREEN CORNER WATT'S UP?

Everything electrical is rated in watts, or in Kilowatts – a thousand watts; so when you're buying electrical items, look for the label that tells you how many watts it consumes. The higher the wattage, the more electricity it consumes, which will not only cost you more but will probably mean that somewhere more carbon dioxide is being produced, unless you're on a "Green" tariff, using renewable energy sources. Household electrical appliances that heat – kettles, ovens, hobs, irons, tumble driers, dishwashers and of course room heaters are all greedy consumers of electricity, often rated at 2 or 3 Kilowatts. Recent large increases in electricity prices can be kept at bay by sensible use of these types of appliances. Just reducing the amount of heat used or the length of time they are switched on can have a significant effect.

If you are buying a new appliance look for one with an "A" rating. Low energy light bulbs are rated "A" and use only a fifth of the energy of tungsten light bulbs. They have come down in price and are now nearly the same price as traditional bulbs and last for up to eight years. Tungsten light bulbs are being phased out over the next few years so it makes sense to use low energy bulbs wherever possible. Halogen light bulbs are the least efficient of all, and the low voltage versions (sometimes confused with low wattage) are the worst. TV sets and computers consume a few hundred watts — plasma screens being the greediest. More importantly than ever before, it makes environmental and economic sense to use electricity thoughtfully and responsibly. So keep the watts down!

by your house at any time. It's easy to use and gives an instantaneous readout of how much your electricity is costing. You can monitor what individual appliances are consuming by switching them on and off – every household should have one!

# MODBURY RECREATION GROUND AND PAVILION WE WILL NOW PROSECUTE OFFENDERS

Despite many requests to both parents and youths, we continue to be plagued by on-going acts of vandalism at the Recreation Ground and Pavilion. To date we have endeavoured to pursue a low key approach, hoping that parental influence would prove sufficient to bring an end to these problems.

Clearly this has not worked and regretfully we will now adopt a hard line approach and will prosecute any person involved in acts of vandalism or illegally entering the premises.

We are working closely with the police on this matter and have asked that any offenders are pursued with the intention of formally prosecuting them.

#### **PLANNING**

Modbury Parish Council recommended and SHDC granted permission for:

Extension and alteration to 8 Silverwell Park.

**SHDC refused permission** for the erection of an agricultural barn at Greenovens.

**SHDC referred** work to tree at 6 Oakwood Drive to the Tree Committee.

**Modbury Parish Council** made the following recommendations:

5A Church Street – Resubmission of application for conversion and extension of garage to form single dwelling house – to be refused.

Conversion of buildings to rear of Pickles Hardware, Broad Street to form two dwellings – to be approved as submitted.

Ruffaton Barn – Re-submission of application for timber frame stable block. Approval recommended as submitted.

#### **ROAD CLOSURE**

Devon County Council have notified the following road closure:

The A3121 between the A38 Slip Road and Kitterford Cross. The closure order is in force for 18 months commencing 3 March 2008. However, it is anticipated that work will complete by 14 March 2008.

Alternative routes will be signposted. A38 – B3372 Marley Head – A385 Redworth, Totnes – A381 Plymouth Road – C794 Avonwick – A3721 Kitterford Cross, and vice versa.

#### **MARS LOTTERY BID**

After a very long wait we have now had the response from the Big Lottery on our bid. Bids totalling £600 Million were received from across the UK and there was a mere £50 Million allocated for distribution in this round.

We were congratulated on the quality of the application and advised that the quality threshold standards had been satisfied. Unfortunately it was felt that the potential number of beneficiaries from the project was small relative to similar projects in more urban areas of the country and primarily, for this reason, we have not on this occasion been successful. (Perhaps we should move Modbury to Sheffield)!

Following discussions with Gary Streeter MP, and various alternative funding bodies we still believe the project can be successfully completed and are pushing ahead with a number of different funding/grant opportunities.

Thank you to all for all your support to date and please continue your support to enable the project to succeed. We will keep you informed as events progress.

Ideally the land would be within walking distance of the town, but also be accessible by car and have a supply of water, but given the apparent scarcity of sites we may need to compromise a little. The land could be rented or perhaps even bought if suitable and the landowner was willing.

# MODBURY OIL SYNDICATE... ARE YOU INTERESTED IN CHEAPER DOMESTIC OIL?

We are investigating the possibility of setting up a bulk oil purchasing syndicate with a local domestic oil supplier. We are in contact with a number of potential suppliers – and hope to finalise details with a single supplier in due course. The scheme would work along the following lines:

- The syndicate member opens an account with the Oil Company which references membership of the syndicate. The customer settles and makes payment to the account in the normal manner.
- The Oil Distribution Company delivers oil on a set day, or in a set week, probably on a monthly basis. (This will depend on the number of members).
- The price of oil will be competitive and reflect the bulk purchasing of the syndicate group. It is expected that the price of oil in any one week can be e-mailed to syndicate members.

For each litre of oil purchased the Oil Company make a small payment into a separate account, which is managed through a committee of the Parish Council, which then redistributes annually, to community activities, the funds raised.

The idea is not new and there are many such schemes in operation across the country. One scheme in a small town in the South East (having a smaller population than Modbury) has over 130 members who purchased nearly 275,000 litres last year. They raised some £1,300 for community activities in the year. As an illustration of the potential savings, a non member of the syndicate was paying £102 more for a 1000 litres of oil than syndicate members. He has now become syndicate member!



#### **SMOKE ALARMS**

Smoke alarms have been responsible for detecting many of the 60,000 house fires the Fire & Rescue Service are called to each year... but many more of the hundreds of deaths that occur each year could be avoided if smoke alarms had been checked and working.

Recently there has been a 30% increase in cases where a smoke alarm didn't work because the battery was disconnected, missing or needed replacing.

Smoke alarms are inexpensive – from less than £5, and available in DIY stores and at many supermarkets. Always make sure that they meet the BS5446 Part 1, have a 'Kitemark' and are fitted in accordance with the instructions.

#### Once a year:

Change the battery (unless it is a 10 year alarm)

#### Once a week:

Check the alarm by pressing the button

#### Twice a year:

Vacuum and wipe the smoke alarm casing to ensure dust isn't blocking the sensor chamber. (For mains wired alarms, switch off first).

Whatever happens – never remove the battery to use it for other purposes.
