#### **A QUESTION OF SERVICE**

On 6<sup>th</sup> February 2012, Her Majesty The Queen celebrates 60 years on the throne. In that time she has seen 12 Prime Ministers, from Winston Churchill to David Cameron.

Much has changed since 1952. Satellites, mobile phones, digital cameras, iPads – the list of new inventions and products is endless. MDF board, for example, dates from the 1980s; the Channel Tunnel was opened in 1994.

Throughout this time, Queen Elizabeth's conduct and service have been an example to all, and the esteem in which she is held is testimony to her dedication. We thank her and join the cry "God save the Queen".

Today's society can sometimes sneer at the ideas of duty and service, yet examples are all around us. Soldiers serve their country; shopkeepers serve their customers. Young people may serve an apprenticeship; others may serve on a committee.

We rely on the work of civil servants (even though we grumble when things are not what we want), and use servers to manage our computer data. The underlying themes are of discharging duties and of doing things which benefit others.


Church services are times when worshippers recognise their duty and service to God. At least, that is how it should be. In some churches (not, of course, ours!) people act as though God were involved in running a chain of social clubs, places where they can go for the enjoyment when they feel like it.

True worship is where people acknowledge that God is their Creator, the King of kings. Christians are called to be servants (literally, 'slaves') of God's Son, Jesus Christ.

He is their Lord and Master, and they serve him willingly. Christianity is about taking every opportunity to proclaim his message of love and salvation by word of mouth and the quality of our lives. That message – the message of the Christmas angels – is to let Jesus be at the centre of life, and to know his blessings, today and for ever.

A big thank you to everyone who made the effort to turn up and take part in the last Walk and Talk. It was a very successful event and it is beginning to establish here in Modbury. Not only will this support community life and health, but it will put more people in to the heart of the town and that should be good for business too. Once established Walk and Talk provides districtwide leaflets specific to the town which will bring more people to Modbury. Details of the next walk are contained in this edition.

Villages in Action have agreed to fund an arts event here in Modbury at the White Hart. This will take place on 17<sup>th</sup> March and will feature quality entertainer Mat Harvey (details to follow in a later edition). 
With nothing on the telly, apart from dust from the log fire, how about planning an even greener year? Perhaps this is the time to make that compost bin for the garden instead of donating your green waste to South Hams Council in the brown bin. Even the smallest of gardens or window boxes could grow herbs, lettuce or tomatoes. And the taste is so much better than mass produced supermarket produce. Plant a few runner beans, or better still climbing French Beans, against a sunny wall and they'll be just as good to look at as that clematis or old climbing rose but be a lot more satisfying in a Sunday lunch. # 10<sup>th</sup> January – end of February: *South Hams Villages: Then and Now*

Photographic display mounted by Kingsbridge Cookworthy Museum showing images from some South Hams villages.

The villages of Ringmore, Kingston, Churchstow, East Allington, Thurlestone, Hope Cove, West Alvington, South Pool and Frogmore are shown in a large black and white archive image with a corresponding modern colour view meticulously taken to allow careful comparison in this new display at The Devon Rural Archive. In most cases, the old images do not have specific dates but are about 100 years old. These 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century images have been selected from over 12,000 in the Kingsbridge Cookworthy Museum database and we are very grateful to those involved in producing this display to allow us to re-hang this 2011 exhibition.


Many of the archive images have been taken by Alfred Edward Fairweather of Salcombe, James Ruth of Aveton Gifford, Mrs Sarah Haynes and Balley and Flower of Kingsbridge, just some of the photographers whose record of the past is so useful for modern researchers.

Each of the chosen views was photographed during the past twelve months by members of the Kingsbridge and District Camera Club. In some cases they show just how little the scenes have changed over the years. Each village view has been carefully researched in the Museum Resource Centre and the information text is displayed alongside the photos. As always, we are open every Tuesday and Thursday between 11 am and 3 pm for private research and would be delighted to welcome people to the archive.
