

#### ST GEORGE'S CHURCH **IS FALLING DOWN**

Last October it had its 5 year Quinquennial Inspection done by a new architect and after further checking at New Year the final inspection report has now been received.

The recommendations by the architect for repairs to the church are listed in priority order on several pages, some being immediate and others to be tackled before the next Quinquennial in 5 years time.

The architect has further recommended that the Church is put on the English Heritage Risk Register because of the state of the roof. However there are several small jobs which the architect has suggested could be done by using self-help. These jobs include redecorating the church doors: renewing varnish on toilet windows, removing vegetation on external walls and others. The fabric committee are calling for volunteers to help liaising with the ladies doing their annual spring cleaning and are suggesting a church cleaning and renovating day on Saturday 5 April. Let us work together, start putting some tender loving care into our church and keep on saving to repair our church roof. **David Scott**







## You've been here so many years, you must be a local girl?

I'm actually from Glasgow but our family moved here in the early 60's as my father had to retire when he contracted TB and needed a much earned healthier life by the sea. I went to Modbury Primary school and then to a convent boarding school in Teignmouth. The family returned to Scotland in 1970, I went to college there to study Hotel Management. We kept a cottage in Modbury and spent all our holidays here.

## I gather your father didn't exactly live the 'retired' life here?

No! One of the things he did here was to run a restaurant called The Gay Cockatoo which was in the old Top of the Steps premises. The owner was a friend of his who had to put the business up for auction and to help him out Dad and Mum went along to bid on it in an attempt to raise the bidding. The story goes that Mum scratched her head at the wrong time and suddenly they were restaurant owners! Their rivals were Dad's great friend Leslie Hoare, the famous TV chef, who ran The Exeter Inn!

## So how did you manage to find your way back to Modbury?

After college I travelling for a year or so and then lived in London, where I met my then husband. We decided to concentrate on family life and in 1982 I returned to a more tranquil and healthy life back in Modbury. A friend and I, Gillian, bought what used to be Thorn's Electrical shop and opened a delicatessen - hence 'MackGills Deli' was born! We specialised in cheese and charcouterie and had between 30 and 40 different cheeses along with our own baked hams, homemade taramasalata, coleslaws and much more!!!

## So how come you went from deli owner to estate agent?

After 10 years at the deli I decided I needed a new direction. By this time I'd had my 2 girls Lorna and Amy, and, having lived in 8 different houses in Modbury, I thought my knowledge of local property was quite extensive, so I joined Marchand Petit where I have now been for 18 years.

#### What are you most proud of?

Apart from my two girls, my house. It took a year to gut, rebuild, renovate and decorate and all with the hard work of local builders!

#### What is the best thing about Modbury? The road out!!!

No seriously, it is a very special place with a very special community, not too big and not too small. If we look after Modbury, Modbury will look after us!

## If you had the chance to travel to one place, where would it be?

Well I love travelling and sometimes even get to Kingsbridge! But one day, I would love travel the whole of Route 93!

#### Who's the most famous person you know?

I went on a date once with the 6'7" Green Cross Code man. I didn't go on a second date, his size was quite a problem, but at least I got to learn to cross the road properly!





David and Donna George started Kitchens by DeZine 12 years ago – I visited their gorgeous showroom in Church Street to find out more....

## I'm interested in what gave you the idea to start a kitchen design business?

(David) I had been working for many years as a Financial Advisor and while I enjoyed the work after being in the job for so long I needed a change. For a few years I had been helping friends design and install kitchens and really enjoyed the process, so when I decided to make a change, kitchen design seemed to be just the right thing for me.

## When did you first get involved in the business, Donna?

David started the business from home to start with, which was an interesting experience with the garage full of kitchen equipment! But I really started once our two children Elliott and Amelia had started school. I do the ordering and keep the books and David does the designing.

#### When did you decide to open a shop?

(David) The business had been going very well for about 6 years and we needed more space. Initially we thought we would need the space for storage but when we heard that 27 Church St had become vacant we went and had a look and the designer in me could picture how good it could be, so we took the plunge and decided to have a shop! It will have been opened 6 years this June and was a really good decision.

## Donna, having a shop must be like going back in time for you!

Yes, I'm back on the main street again!! I worked in Top of the Steps when Burda Gage owned it for about 11 yrs. In fact David used to come into Top of the Steps just to see me before we were married.

(David) Yes, I ended up with so many salt cellars, napkin rings etc. as I had to buy things when I went in to see Donna!

## I know that Donna is a local girl but where are you from David?

Well, I was born in Scotland but my family are mainly from Plymouth and Brixham. I come from a maritime background as many of my family were, and still are, trawler fishermen.

## Donna, how long have your family been in Modbury?

I think we go back 4 or 5 generations, my two brothers and I were born here and are still in the area. My Mum was a Hill and worked in the Post Office when she left school and my Dad ran a bread round. My grandmother was a Fox and was born in the Toll House on the way out to Kingsbridge, she was one of 11. Her bedroom was the cupboard under the stairs, way before Harry Potter!!

**Do you have a place you both like visiting?** Yes, we both love Italy, especially Sorrento and around the Amalfi coast.

What would you like to be doing next year? I think that if next year we are as busy as we are now, that would be nice.

#### How long have you lived in Modbury?

My parents moved to Modbury when I was two and I went to Modbury Primary School and then Ivybridge Community College. After that I went to Plymouth University to read Architecture and met Jon my husband who was also studying Architecture.

## You run a business called Nest Design with Jon, how did that come about?

Once I qualified I worked for a large firm in Totnes for 9 yrs and gained great experience working on residential and coastal properties as well as the National Trust. In 2010 Jon and I decided to start our own business but I continued to work with the Totnes practice to start with. Once we had our first child, Pia, it was time to join Jon at Nest Design which I did in 2013. As I am about to have our second child it is much more convenient to work from home.

## Have you designed anywhere we would know?

I designed the Visitors Centre in Castle Drogo. The National Trust are great to work for, they are open to new ideas and are very inventive when it's not a listed building which is great for an architect!

#### What type of architecture do you prefer?

I enjoy any new project but particularly love creating places for people and understanding how they use the place and space in their lives.

#### Have you done much travelling?

During our training we had two years where we worked but had holidays in between jobs and Jon and I travelled as much as we could. We travelled to Asia which was great but the most enjoyable and interesting was travelling around Central America which we did for several months. We fell in love with Guatemala.

#### What made you come back to Modbury?

When we decided to start a family we thought Modbury was a great place to grow up in especially having my parents, sister and brother living here as well. I enjoyed my childhood here and hope my children will too!

#### What's your favourite place?

Guatemala would be first on the list but we love going to Westcombe beach.

What are you most proud of? Setting up Nest Design with Jon.





## Jo Highley - Suzuki Piano Teacher

#### From where do you originate?

I come from Luton, Bedfordshire. I went to college in London, worked in Hong Kong for four years, lived and worked in London again, and then moved here in 2003 with my husband, Richard, and our two sons. We often came to play golf at Bigbury and fell in love with the area.

#### Have you always been a piano teacher?

No, I was a partner in a City law firm. When we moved down here, working in London during the week became much more difficult. I had always played the piano, and I found that I was spending more time playing music, and wanted to spend less time doing law!

## So what made you make the drastic change in direction?

When we moved to Modbury, I met Bella P-B through the Modbury Players' children's production of the Sorcerer's Spell. I was asked to play the piano for the children, and also to help them to play their instruments as part of a mini-orchestra. Bella "spotted" me as a likely candidate to be a piano teacher, and suggested that I should investigate the Suzuki Method of learning to play, which I did. I found that it suited my way of thinking perfectly and I then auditioned to become a trainee teacher.

#### What is The Suzuki Method?

The Suzuki Method involves learning to play an instrument by asking the child to listen to music right from the beginning, and not to read music until the listening habit and good techniques are firmly established. In this way, the child learns to be musical right from the start.



#### What are you most proud of?

I feel very lucky that fairly late in life I have been able to spend time doing something that I feel is very worthwhile - not only teaching children, but spending time doing what I love, which is working towards becoming a better pianist and musician. This includes helping young singers and players, and playing my part in community events. I am also lucky enough to lead the Modbury Gospel Singers which is a great pleasure for me and I am very proud of their effort and enthusiasm. I am also fortunate that Alex and Jack, our two sons are enthusiastic about their music, and occasionally do some practice! Alex plays the piano and cello and Jack the violin. If they continue to play when they are grown-up that will make me very happy.

#### What do you like to do in your spare time?

I like practising the piano. That sounds very boring though – I also like running, walking (with or without dogs), reading, cooking, eating and playing music with other people.

In early 2014 with the drive and commitment of the Modbury Society, the Town was awarded the **Best Kept** (Large) Village;

this was followed by the recognition of **Modbury** within the "**Walkers are Welcome**" national scheme.

Finally the Project **Modbury Heritage Walks** will have been launched on March 29<sup>th</sup> in Poundwell by Richard Foss, Chairman of the South Devon AONB.

This marketing initiative is to generate interest in Modbury as an exciting Town to visit, with the publication of **An Explorers Guide to Modbury**, providing details of the Town, and a Heritage Town Guided Walk. This is supported by Information boards in Poundwell describing both the Town and the Countryside Walks.

Adjacent to the site is an **Albion Corn Press** that was donated by Shirley Batten and lovingly restored by Brian Weeks.

To enable residents and potential visitors to access the wide range of information about **Modbury**, two web sites, The **Unique Heritage of Modbury** and **Visit Modbury**, have specific sections providing Heritage Walks Information.

#### National Service "Gathering". February 2014.

This year we held the gathering in the Exeter Inn, a well-known meeting place for Royalist Troops. Nine stalwart ex national servicemen met to reflect on their service life and experiences, when they were conscripted for up to two years. #### The Green Corner

We have just returned from visiting daughter and family in New Zealand, where five years old grand-daughter Annabelle has been learning about the life cycle of the giant Monarch Butterfly. Her classroom at school and a flower trough outside her bedroom have become nurseries for this beautiful insect, which depends on the milkweed



for its food and reproduction. In its home territory of North America it is famous for migrating thousands of miles in both directions from Canada to Mexico. Occasionally a few turn up in Britain having flown across the Atlantic. However, due to widespread crop spraying on its migratory route, its existence is threatened as the milkweed on which its life depends is being killed by the sprays.

So what has this got to do with Modbury? Well, after the wettest winter ever, our own native insects, butterflies and bees are going to have a tough time to exist this year and they need our help. It is very tempting to use weed killer and insect sprays indiscriminately but always read the label and try and avoid using them in your garden at all this year. Plant some nectar-bearing plants like buddleia, lavender and rosemary, and see how the bees and butterflies gather round. We have all read about certain insect sprays now being blamed for the decline in honey bees, and this is now spreading to wild bumble bees. Our food crops depend on them.

Perhaps more importantly, by upsetting the balance of nature we are in danger of denying the next generation of grandchildren the delight of watching a bee gather pollen from a flower or a butterfly emerging from its cocoon.



#### **Parish News**

The proposed **Traffic Regulation Order (TRO)** has been advertised for consultation and you may have seen notices in various parts of town. It covers parts of Brownston Street, Galpin Street, New Road, Scalders Lane, The Orchard, Bunkers Hill, Pound-well Street, Poundwell Meadow, Church Lane, Barracks Road and Back Street. It introduces some new double yellow lines to facilitate traffic movement and corrects some "errors" made in the past. The consultation was due to end on 28<sup>th</sup> March but the Parish Council has asked that this be extended by two weeks. If you have not commented and wish to do so then write to the County Solicitor, County Hall, Topsham Road, Exeter EX2 4QD quoting reference IMR/B10319 as soon as possible. A copy of the order is in the Post Office and the parish office.

#### Development of 80 houses and 0.5 hectare employment land west of Palm Cross Green.

A public drop-in session is being held on the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> April. Details are elsewhere in the Messenger. Anyone can go along and ask questions or make suggestions about the development. The parish council has listed as priorities :-

the provision of affordable and social housing;

that the whole site is planned comprehensively (not just the land currently under the control of Bloor Homes);

that pedestrian and vehicular safety improvements are made at Palm Cross Green;

that serious consideration is given to a link road from Coppers Corner to Barrack Road to reduce traffic past the school; that the Green remains as open space.

A further public session will be held later in the summer with more details of what the development will look like and a full planning application is intended to be made in the autumn.

If you want to apply for one of the affordable houses you should get your name on the Devon Home Choice list (<u>http://www.devonhomechoice.com/</u>). An officer from South Hams housing department will be at the drop in session to help. *Mark Lawrence*
