the 90th birthday of HRH Elizabeth II. Which King or Queen will you come as – maybe the Queen of Hearts or the King of Rock and Roll?



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### Chairperson's Report – Lucy Brown - Annual Parish Meeting March 14th 2016

Good evening and thank you very much for attending the Annual Parish Meeting. This meeting is an opportunity for representatives from Parish Groups to report their activities to parishioners, and for parishioners to raise issues with the Parish Council. It is also an opportunity for the Parish Council Chair, the District Councillor and the County Councillor to report to the parish on their year's activities.

I will get the ball rolling with the Chairperson's report. As you know the 4 yearly elections for Parish Councillors were held in May 2015. There were sufficient prospective councillors standing to hold an election and the resulting council composed of 8 new councillors and 4 who had previously served as councillors. I would like to thank the previous Parish Council for their dedicated work for Modbury. As a largely new council we have had a lot to learn and being a new Chairperson – even more to learn! The council undertook training from DALC (Devon Association of Local Councils) in the various processes relevant to their position. A new Clerk started in October, who is getting up to speed at a rapid rate and undertaking training in her role.

A major challenge of the year was for the Council to be effective on behalf of the parish in influencing the outcome of the planning application for 93 houses west of Palm Cross Green. The Parish Council objected to the number of houses and the design of the employment building. Unfortunately our objections were not upheld and the planning permission went through without amendments. However we are still hoping we can influence the design.

An extra 93 households will bring benefits to Modbury, more trade for the businesses, children for the school, and some affordable homes. The Parish Council negotiated with the developer to create a car park just inside the development to replace the parking at Palm Cross Green. The parish will own the new car park. The previous car park will now form the gateway between the development and the town and will be landscaped, to include a new play area. In consultation with parishioners and Bloor we have suggested names for the roads in the development, all based on the historic field names associated with the site.

However, despite a lengthy consultation period, the new development did not contain some of the things the community wanted. We were particularly disappointed that the concerns that we raised with South Hams Planning Department and Devon Highways regarding access to the development did not result in adjustments to take pressure off the A379 and Barracks Road. We also strongly believe a safe bus stop in this area is essential and will be continuing to work on this issue.

On a positive note, this year saw the launch of the Neighbourhood Plan Group, which is working hard to represent the aspirations of parishioners to form a 15-year plan for Modbury. They are undertaking a number of consultations with local people and I do encourage you to have your say with this group who really do listen!

Being a parish councillor has allowed me to gain an insight into how 'things get done' in Modbury. As I mentioned in the January Modbury Messenger, there are a million and one tasks that are covered by volunteers, some councillors and some parishioners. While the flood prevention work by DCC appears to be having some impact, the flooding on December 30th was undoubtedly made less severe by the all-hands on deck approach of local people including a team of councillors. Behind the scenes work by Councillors Cole and Taylor has also reduced the risk of flooding by regular drain clearing and preventative steps upstream. Thank you to all of you who are involved with these community minded tasks that make Modbury a safer and better functioning town than it would be otherwise.

Looking to the future the council have pledged a sum for the restoration of the paintwork of the church clock, which, fairly soon, will be looking shiny and new as part of the Raise the Roof project. The council are also keen to support local efforts to increase the sustainability of the town. Councillor Turner has recently been liaising with school to support the creation of a garden project, using a funding stream from our County Councillor. There is also talk of celebrating Modbury's developing community orchards through a possible Apple Day, which sounds very exciting.

You will be pleased to know that we have kept the Modbury Parish precept at its current level. Putting this in context, DCC have increased council tax by 4% and SHDC by 3.5%.

The Parish Council welcome feedback from parishioners - we are here for you! Please do pop into the Parish Office on a Saturday morning to talk to a Parish Councillor or speak to Sacha Hagar, the Parish Clerk who is available on Mondays from 2-4m in the Parish Office. All Parish Councillors' contact details are on the Modbury Parish Council website.

# **District Council Report**

- 1. **Special Award** I am very pleased to report that South Hams District Council has won Council of the Year together with is shared services partner West Devon Borough Council. The reason why the council has won this national award is due to the way in which it has transformed in order to respond to the challenges faced both financial and changing customer demand and need. Rather than cut services and keep on doing this each time our government grant has been reduced the council planned ahead with a radical transformation programme chaining the ways in which the officers work and are recruited, changing the working environment and technology to allow agile working and more self-serve and reorganising the governance and staffing structures. It has meant a reduction in the workforce but it has also meant that the council has protected front line services only 10% of councils nationally have achieved this.
- 2. **Council Tax** For the last four years the district council has kept its share of the council tax below the 2% threshold beyond which a referendum would be triggered. Last year we froze council tax. Just ahead of the budget the Chancellor allowed us to increase our council tax beyond the 2% threshold without a referendum and the council voted to take advantage of this in order to shore up our financial position ahead of needing to make more savings in the future. This means that our share of the council tax will increase by 10 pence a week/£5 a year on a Band D property.
- 3. Your Account watch out in your council tax bill for a leaflet called Your Account. This leaflet is aimed at encouraging you to open an on line account so that you can being to transact with us on line from a single site. Over time more and more self-serve options will be added to your account and it will keep a record of any concerns you raise with the council as well as responses to it. The officers at SHDC will also be able to see this same single view of residents which should help the council to manage cases and serve you better. It is a process in development, to be promoted over the next few years and feedback is welcome.




A series of meetings and events will be arranged over the next few months aimed at sharing the information and ideas we have gathered, and seeking your comments and



# Understanding Dementia





Hiya guys, as a person with Dementia (since 2007) I have been asked to explain what people might come across when they meet someone with dementia. Here are some examples:-

People with dementia may have trouble understanding their money. They may appear to struggle to understand the amount they have to pay and the amount they have to give you. This applies in shops, banks and post offices etc. A little patience and understanding will help enormously.

Dementia sometimes causes a 'catatonic trance'; it may look like 'daydreaming'. Looking or becoming confused is also very common, this happens when the person with dementia is having a problem focusing on what to do or where to go next. A little gentle reassurance and an offer of help will be valued.


A person may reach out for something and not quite understand why they haven't been able to get what they want. Also bumping into things and looking very unsure as where they are putting their next step is common, you can often see the look of confusion in their eyes. In cases of non-Dementia, they usually look confident but still can't get to grips with doing the smallest things, this could mean there are other non-Dementia causes involved.

Someone with Dementia tends to repeat themselves and may ask you the same thing, sometimes over and over again. A little patience and a helping hand to take them to what they are looking for will be valued; if they can see what they want, usually that will do the trick. Stammering and stuttering are not always just signs of a speech impediment it can also be symptomatic of dementia as I know from personal experience. Sometimes people with this illness will try and say something but will come out completely non-sensical, other times you will see their sheer frustration at not being able to say what they want to say. People with dementia doing this will look very frustrated and sometimes even angry. People who have lived with a speech disorder for some time don't usually react like this.

### 5. Repetitiveness

This comes in many forms but the most common form after speech repetitiveness is doing the same action time and time again. This may include putting more than one of the same products in their shopping baskets/trolleys, or where shops are concerned, they may buy the same thing over and over again. This does not only include food retail but also places like Post Offices and banks. I have personally known cases where people who are known to a butcher have bought impractically large amounts of meat when it is clearly unlikely that they need so much and have never been asked the question 'why?'. A risk of them doing this can be that perishable foods are not consumed within the safe life of the product.

In larger retail outlets, checkout staff scanning items and need to be aware that if a person is having trouble keeping up with the conveyor speed, to slow down the process to a more manageable pace. Sometimes the speed items reach the packing area is enough to confuse an able bodied person, let alone someone with dementia. This happened to me in a busy supermarket, but once I brought it to the attention of the manager, they put some training into place to look out now for anybody struggling with the speed of the tills.



### 7. Talking about Dementia

Some people with dementia don't care who knows (eg. me!) and others feel quite ashamed of having it or are in complete denial. It's your approach that matter is important here. Don't ask if people are suffering with Dementia, but try to keep in mind that Dementia is a debilitating disease of the brain and that it is not always an age related disorder. Early onset Dementia has been diagnosed in people as young as early their 50s.

If someone volunteers the information that they have Dementia, ask them what kind of dementia, how long they have had it and how well they manage it. Sometimes showing an interest in them will let them know they are not on their own. My personal experience is that Dementia can seem the 'loneliest disease in the world"

In short, the more people understand this disease and talk about it, the more the stigma that is attached to it, will be reduced and eventually be resigned to a distant memory.

Thank you so much for your understanding and please remember, the person who is having these troubled times in front of you, could one day be you yourself.

# Modbury Local History Society

The talk on 9th March was given by Roger Barrett, curator of the Salcombe Maritime Museum. His subject was SHIPBUILDING IN THE KINGSBRIDGE ESTUARY. Many of the illustrations portrayed were from the museum, and we were surprised at the size and number of ships that were built, mainly in the 1800's. They were crewed by local men and made long distance journeys to all parts of the world. Many of the cargoes consisted of fruit and a huge industry developed. Sailing ships were gradually replaced by steam ships but several of the shipyards are still in existence. After replying to various questions, Roger was warmly thanked by chairman, Mary Timmis, who said that we would be hoping to visit his museum in the near future. Roger will be returning in October with a film and talk about the Salcombe Lifeboat disaster; he has written a book about this subject.

Our next talk will be given by Bill Scarratt on April 13th, he has researched the building of Plymouth Breakwater. This will be the last talk in our present series and again we are grateful to the management of the White Hart for their cooperation.

We were also faced with fallen dead trees blocking Runaway Lane but again, with volunteer assistance, a clear passage was soon restored.

Two hours of fun followed and eventually the culvert was unblocked, but a huge amount of mud remained as did the pond. The next day, after a Mother's Day lunch, the Weeks' family, could not resist the temptation to finish the job, so spent another afternoon as hydraulic engineers to complete the task. The stream is now back to normal providing its usual bathing facilities for 'hot dogs'.


